We have shared and supported the European target of halving road accidents by 2010 only as an interim step to continue toward the finish line corresponding to the "vision zero" of some European Countries, or to the equivalent expression "stop the road carnage" contained in the AIFVS statute. A goal that can not be accused of utopia; rather, it's supported by strong and painful reasons of civilization: a victim can't ever be a toll to be paid to the progress! Although the results achieved, Italy didn't reach the 2010 halving! Why couldn't we do more? Perhaps, in those who legislate and administer laws hasn't been enough awareness that the institutions have the specific task of protecting human rights? Are the choices for the prevention and justice really strategic to counteract the massacre? Where do the dysfunctions that impede the achievement of optimal results lurk? And how will the IV European Road Safety Plan for 2020, with it's aim of halving the victims rate, be implemented in our area? We need to expose our beliefs, highlighting the lacks of organization and the choices of half-measures for prevention and justice, that allow the maintenance of the massacre. We support the need for mobility, but we can not accept that it's irrationally managed, decreasing human quality, especially in urban areas, and damaging health with injuries and deaths, but also with environmental pollution, stress, loneliness. Let's discuss together. We have a duty to stop the road carnage: skipping it is a sign of moral decay and disrespect. We have a duty not to flood the already inefficient justice even to the failures of prevention. We have the duty not to harm the victims' dignity with underestimation of offense and damage and offensive compensations. We must help the judiciary to restore social peace, often thwarted by professionalisms that don't interact with ethics, or by the incompetence of experts who make unreliable investigations, or by tortuous procedures that wear out the trials and exacerbate the conflict. We must recognize that such big goals can't be reached by us alone, but require a shared commitment and synergy.
